The Season of Lent...


While some of us may still have some Christmas decorations hanging around, the calendar continues to move, and this month, we begin our journey toward the cross and the Resurrection. We call this 40 day (plus Sundays) season Lent, and this year, it begins on February 14 – Valentine's Day. While the convergence of a day that has become a celebration of romantic love and a day that encourages us to repent of our sins and consider our morality may seem strange, these two days are similar in that they both focus on love. Our worship theme is "Depths of Love," as we pray with Ephesians 3:18 that we can "have the power to understand, as all God's people should, how wide, how long, how high, and how deep God's love is."

How can we even begin to understand the depths of God's love? What does it mean to anchor yourself in love and in God this Lent? As we think of Lenten discipline we might naturally associate it with shadows, emptiness, and suffering. Yes, these are elements of the Lenten journey, to be sure, but so is love. How will you take on a Lenten practice that is rooted in love this year? Author Traci Smith suggests three possibilities:

- **Lovingkindness Meditation:** You can find a guided loving kindness meditation at: https://bit.ly/lkmeditate. The basic idea is to think warmly first toward yourself, then toward someone you love, and finally toward an enemy. A few minutes per day makes a significant difference.
- **Practicing Self-Compassion:** Every morning say to yourself "I am God's beloved child. God loves me unconditionally." This may sound simple, but how often do we neglect to extend love and hospitality to ourselves?
- **Scripture Memorization:** Many of us know the beautiful and familiar words of 1 Corinthians 13 that begins "Love is patient. Love is kind." This love is not referring, specifically, to romantic love, but rather God's perfect love, the love that we are called to share. Perhaps you can commit to memorizing the whole chapter this Lent and to finding ways to practice all those aspects of love.

Whatever Lenten practice you might take on, our prayer for you this Lenten season is "May you experience the love of Christ, though it is too great to understand fully. Then you will be made complete with all the fullness of life and power that comes from God." (Ephesians 3:19)

A Dawnings Update

Thoughts from Your Pastors...

Dawn - it's the time of day when things, whose forms had been obscured by shadow, begin to get clearer. Detail is dark and shapes indistinguishable; then, light begins to reveal that which was once hidden. We begin to see that to which we were once blind.

But dawn is not yet daylight. All darkness has not been complete clarity. It is only the beginning of a revealing. It's the time when our eyes still strain to see something that we were not seeing so clearly before, yet there is still more clarity to come.

We, as a new body of believers, have been trying to see something that we have, perhaps, not seen before (at least not as clearly as we might). Dawnings is the right word. We are trying to be enlightened: enlightened about who we are as individuals, enlightened about our identity as a congregation, enlightened about our identity in community with those nearby who need the Savior that we know.

We could spend a great deal of time trying to recall what we once perceived as God's way; however, it is God's new dream for which we are straining our spiritual eyes to see through the dim lights of dawn. We are not trying to "merge" two congregations, hoping that by doing that which we have done before we might bring our collective pasts back to life. We are, by praying and listening, trying to put ourselves in a spiritual state of heart and mind so that God's plan for our future might begin to come to light in us.

Our next session, which you can read more about below, is on Sunday, February 4 following worship. We urge you to make every effort to join the rest of our church family in preparing for God's Light to Dawn on us. Please be there if at all possible; your presence is absolutely critical. See you as the sun (or Son) continues to rise and dawn approaches!

Where We Are and Where We Are Going...

Where We Have Been: In our first two sessions, we have discussed our own personal stories (because, after all, our new church is made up of each of us as individuals) and our church's story - both our individual congregations and our new church. The "circles" we have drawn help us see the giftedness and characteristics of our new church.

Our Next Session: In our next Dawnings session, which will be immediately after worship on February 4, we will once again, listen for God's answer to the questions: "Who do you want us to be now?" and "What do you want us to do now?". In this session, we will be thinking about our community's story. There is a sign-up sheet in the foyer, and knowing how many are coming helps us to be sure there will be plenty of smoked pulled pork for all. We would love for you to bring a side dish or dessert to share, as well.

To prepare for this session, we ask that you consider the following:

- What are three positive things about Roanoke? What are three challenges Roanoke faces?
- What are three positive things about our church's neighborhood? What are three challenges our neighborhood faces? (We are
 defining a loose rectangle as our neighborhood, with the boundaries being 419/Electric Road, Green Valley neighborhood, Brambleton
 Avenue, and Virginia Western Community College.)

What's Next? After the February 4 Dawnings session, the Dawnings leadership team will be compiling all the information we have received during the sessions. We will spend some time listening to what our "My Story," "My Church's Story," and "My Community's Story" circles, and especially the ways in which they overlap, tell us about our church's purpose and vision. We will then present what we have heard to the church for consideration no later than March 17.

What About a Name? We know many of us are eager to have a name for our new church. We believe that knowing who God is calling us to be will also help us determine a name for our church. As we have throughout this process, we ask that you continue to pray for guidance and for indifference to everything except God's will. Won't it be so exciting when we can finally celebrate with a name and a purpose and vision for our new church? We continue the journey together!
